Deserters and Conscientious Objectors from Russia, Belarus and Ukraine need our support.

Russian conscientious objectors are usually rejected in asylum proceedings, and in Ukraine, conscientious objectors are sentenced to long prison terms. More than 100 organizations from over 20 countries show their solidarity and stand up for these people. Regarding the war in Ukraine, they demand: protection and asylum for conscientious objectors and deserters from Russia, Belarus, and Ukraine. The human right to conscientious objection must also be recognized in times of war.

Conscientious Objection in Russia, Belarus and Ukraine

The three countries have different regulations on conscription, the right to conscientious objection, military draft evasion and desertion. Russia and Belarus do not comply with international regulations. Ukraine suspended the right to conscientious objection when the war began.

In **Russia and Belarus**, applying for conscientious objection is only possible until conscription. There is no right to conscientious objection for reservists and soldiers, not even for those who are affected by mobilization.

Forced recruitment is taking place in the **separatist areas**. There is no right to conscientious objection. Conscientious objectors are sent to war or are imprisoned.

Ukraine has already sentenced some conscientious objectors to several years in prison.

It is precisely in the event of war that the human right to conscientious objection is a precious good and must be guaranteed. No one may be forced to serve in the military against their conviction.

In the first year of the war, hundreds of thousands of people on all sides evaded military service. Russian and Belarusian conscientious objectors fled mainly to Kazakhstan, Georgia or Armenia while Ukrainian conscientious objectors have often left for countries of the European Union.

Asylum in case of conscientious objection and desertion

More and more people from Russia and Belarus do not want to participate in the war against Ukraine, which is against international law. There are conscientious objectors in Ukraine, too. What happens when they apply for asylum in Europe? The principle of jurisprudence is that prosecution and punishment for a refusal is still classified as legitimate state action. Anyone who is threatened with prosecution solely for this reason will not be granted asylum.

Germany had promised that Russian deserters would receive refugee protection. In France, the National Court of Asylum clarified that Russian objectors must provide evidence that they are called up. In Lithuania, applications of Belarusian deserters were rejected because they would pose a “threat to state security“. In a lot of other cases, objectors got negative decisions if they couldn't show that they were called up. Anyone who evaded recruitment at an early stage is considered to have withdrawn from military service. It is obvious that the commitments made are completely inadequate.

In Ukraine, too, there are conscientious objectors who do not want to take part in the fighting. For all of them, the human right to conscientious objection, as established

by the European Court of Human Rights in 2011, must be guaranteed. If this right is violated, they must be protected as refugees. The humanitarian residence permit currently granted on a temporary basis does not equal permanent protection.
